BAYOU BEND AND THE BAYOU BEND DOCENT ORGANIZATION

The Bayou Bend Collection began in 1920 when Miss Ima Hogg was having her portrait painted in the studio of Wayman Adams in New York City. Intrigued by the mid-eighteenth-century chair in which she was posing, Miss Hogg offered to purchase it. When the artist refused to sell it, Miss Hogg acquired a chair that was as close to that Adams chair as possible. The purchase of that simple Queen Anne armchair was the beginning of a lifelong passion for collecting, as Miss Hogg became one of the first serious collectors of early American furniture.

In 1957, Miss Hogg gifted her home and collection to the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston (MFAH). Today, Bayou Bend houses the early American decorative arts collection of the Museum, with more than 2,500 objects made or used in America between 1620 and 1876 on view in 28 period room settings. The collection includes furniture, paintings, prints, metals, ceramics, textiles, glass, and sculpture.

In preparation for Bayou Bend's public opening in 1961, Ima Hogg invited a group of 22 women to attend a training class to be docent interpreters of the collection. The provisional class of 1961 was the beginning of what is now known as the Bayou Bend Docent Organization (BBDO), which today numbers more than 200 active and 300 sustaining members. These dedicated volunteers donate their time and expertise, leading tours of the house and interpreting the collection through ongoing scholarship. Since 1961, more than 800 women and men have joined the ranks of the BBDO and served as docents at Bayou Bend.

Over fifty-five years later, the docent role remains the same as envisioned by Miss Hogg; docents serve as hosts, public representatives, teachers, and guardians of her superb collection of American decorative arts. The BBDO is self-governed by a board of 18, and docents work in partnership with Museum staff to fill many different and evolving needs of both the Museum and its guests.

THE PROVISIONAL COURSE

The provisional docent course covers material on American history, American decorative arts, and interpretive skills. At the conclusion of the course, provisionals are expected to deliver tours of Bayou Bend that are knowledge-based, visitor-centered, cohesive, and personal. This course is very interactive and class members are expected to be prepared and participate actively in class activities and discussions.







Attendance

- Class meets from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Mondays, January 22—May 21, 2018. There is no class on March 12.
- Class members may miss no more than two of the class sessions. Excluding sickness or emergency, absences must be excused in advance.
- Class members are responsible for the information that was provided on missed weeks by independent study, or by consulting classmates or mentor docents.

Class Preparation and Homework

- There will be reading in the class textbooks and written assignments in preparation for classes each week.
- Additional time outside of Monday class is required for shadowing tours, tour practice, studying, and research.
- Class members find that it is essential to practice or study in the collection, either in study groups, with a mentor, or independently. While there is no specific time requirement for this, most find that this practice and study are needed to pass the test tour at the end of the course.

Requirements for Class Completion

- Provisional class members must pass a final test tour
 with the head of education in June 2018. At that time,
 interpretive skills and collection knowledge will be
 evaluated and discussed. The evaluation sheet that
 will be used will be shared with participants the first
 week of class.
- Provisionals must complete a research project that supports the scholarship of Bayou Bend (focusing on collection objects, artists, Hogg family history, etc.) and makes use of the Kitty King Powell Library. Specifics will be shared during the early weeks of class. This project is due by September 1, 2018.

The Provisional Year (July 2018-June 2019)

- After class members pass the final test tour, they are placed on the tour schedule for eleven months of active touring. After successfully completing one final check-in tour with a mentor at the end of the provisional year, provisionals become full active members of the BBDO.
- Provisionals must be willing, available, and flexible to tour as needed:
 - Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday mornings or afternoons;
 Friday and Saturday mornings (assigned in four-month shifts)
 - School tours, group tours, and station-guided tours
- Attendance is required at General Meetings on the third Monday of each month, October through May (excluding December and January) as well as the September luncheons and January coffees.

EXPECTATIONS OF MEMBERS OF THE BAYOU BEND DOCENT ORGANIZATION













A Bayou Bend docent is a:

- **Host,** continuing Miss Hogg's legacy of gracious hospitality at Bayou Bend.
- **Teacher,** sharing information about the collection with guests, answering questions, and providing a personal, visitor-centered tour.
- **Security officer**, ensuring that guests abide by the rules and regulations of the Museum.
- Public representative, serving as Bayou Bend's link to the public, knowing that the docent's performance, attitude, appearance, and personality will be the impression of Bayou Bend and the Museum that guests will remember after their visit.

Qualities of a Bayou Bend docent:

- Is a team player.
- Is reliable, flexible, and respects all rules.
- Enjoys learning and sharing knowledge with guests of all ages and backgrounds.

Docents are expected to:

- Be responsible for a weekly tour. The tour schedule is a four-month format with the following requirements:
 - Two months of *touring* once a week
 - One month of "odd-job" tour assignments, varying by week
 - One month OFF
 - All docents are off in August
- Attend all General Meetings—these are typically held on the third Monday of each month, October through May (excluding December and January).
- Attend both a September luncheon and a January coffee.
- Participate in ongoing continuing education opportunities.
- Be flexible in regard to types of tours: school, group, and station-guided.
- Be thoroughly fluent in collection information, as tours are delivered without the use of scripts.
- Always arrive 15 minutes ahead of scheduled tour time.
- Make a three-year commitment to BBDO following course completion (includes provisional year of touring—therefore, July 2018—July 2021).
- Stay up-to-date on collection information, touring procedures, and interpretive techniques.

The Bayou Bend education department offers a wide range of frequent continuing education opportunities, building on the firm foundation of the provisional course, personal study, and touring experience.


Opportunities include:


In addition to regular touring duties, Bayou Bend docents are encouraged to participate and become involved in:
